Throughout the year, our core programs and services, that include education, childcare, and community short courses, experienced notable growth. Enrolments across all educational programs increased, and our Carers Project employment program delivered another successful year. Additionally, our family learning program at Western English Language School continued to thrive.

We also organised a number of community events and celebrations, such as the Winter Festival, Science Week, Children's Week, Carer's Expo, and more, which were well-received by the community. Our food relief



program expanded significantly, with four pop-up markets at Francis St in partnership with Duke St Neighbourhood House and Maidstone/Braybrook Neighbourhood House. Our efforts in food relief even garnered attention from ABC TV's 7.30 report.

Our partnerships and stakeholders play a crucial role in our success. Our well established partnership continued with Learning for Employment partners, Nourish partners, U3A Maribyrnong, Skilling Employment & Aid Enterprises Australia Inc., along with the many other collaborations and partners contributed significantly to the delivery of high-quality programs and services. It was pleasing that financially, YCC finished the year with a surplus, enabling us to sustain and enhance our offerings to the community.

Looking ahead to 2024, we are focused on completing the goals outlined in our operational and strategic plans while initiating work on a new three-year plan. Our commitment remains to meet the evolving needs of our community through innovative programs and services.

I extend my gratitude to our dedicated staff and volunteers for their hard work and commitment to our mission. I am delighted to report that YCC experienced a successful year in terms of financial performance. Our total income for the year amounted to 2.96m, representing 13% increase compared to the previous year. This increase can be attributed to higher income from educational programs.

Our expenses for the year were diligently managed to ensure efficient use of resources while fulfilling our mission. Expenses were 12k above last year (0.4% increase). Noteworthy is our continuing commitment to community based programs.



After accounting for all expenses, I am pleased to announce that we achieved a net surplus of 54k for the fiscal year. This surplus will be reinvested ensuring the sustainability and growth of our organization.

Our organization remains in a stable financial position with total assets valued at 3.6m and liabilities of 650k. We have also maintained healthy reserves to mitigate unforeseen challenges and support future initiatives. Our actual financial results aligned with the budgetary projections set at the beginning of the year. Despite facing inflationary challenges, we successfully managed to adapt and maintain financial stability.

I would like to extend my sincere gratitude to our donors, volunteers, Committee of Management members, and staff for their unwavering dedication and support throughout the year. It is through your collective efforts that we have been able to achieve our financial goals and further our mission.

In conclusion, I am proud of the achievements we have made this year and remain committed to upholding transparency and accountability in all our financial endeavours. I encourage all stakeholders to review the accompanying financial statements and reach out with any questions or feedback. Thank you for your continued trust and support.

English Language Programs

In 2023 our English language courses continued to attract significant numbers of students from the western suburbs and beyond. Students enrolled in courses that reflected their starting level of English whether that be Course in Initial EAL, Course in EAL, Certificates I, II or III in EAL. As their language developed, students moved to the next level throughout the year.

Our English Language courses are delivered via state and federal funding arrangements. The Adult Migrant English Program (AMEP) attracts the largest cohort of students and is federally funded. The Skills for Education and Employment (SEE) program is also federally funded, and we experienced continued growth throughout 2023. The state funded English Language programs come via Skills First, and we experienced moderate growth in this cohort in 2023.

Our English Language programs are lucky enough to have a number of education volunteers who work with our teachers to support our students. We are very appreciative of the work that the following volunteers provide us: Anh Nguyen, Freda Erlich, Nathan Hennequin, Phuong Nguyen, Kaliopi Alvarez and Tess Zanforlin. Without their time and boundless enthusiasm, we could not deliver the quality programs we deliver year after year.

Community engagement remains an integral part of our English Language programs as many of our students are recently arrived in Australia. Below are listed some of the groups our students interacted with throughout the year.

· CALDplay Sports Program - students participated in a program developed by the Western Bulldogs Community Foundation. The Foundation engage the students in sports activities, and provide employment sessions (which includes CV writing, industry checks and interview techniques).

 \cdot LiverWELL - provided health workshops to our students on viral hepatitis and liver health. In recognition of the level of engagement of our students, YCC received an award in recognition of our contribution to enhancing understanding of liver health in the community.

• Multicultural Centre for Women's Health speaker who presented a seminar on women's health during Women's Health Week.

· Life Saving Victoria presented a 'Meet a Lifesaver' water safety sessions. They also presented a program on 'Resuscitate a Mate' which included an introduction to CPR and first aid.

 \cdot Services Australia visited our students regularly to provide information and updates on government services.

· WEstjustice presented sessions on family violence, the law and your rights.

Vocational Education and Training Program

Our vocational courses continued to attract good numbers of students wanting to train for specific jobs in the health and education service sectors. Students trained to become Personal Care Attendants in aged care and disability services and Education Support Workers. Seventy percent of students who commenced their Certificate III or IV with us, successfully completed their course. Of those, 80% gained employment in the field they trained in.

When students enrol in our vocational courses, their main goal is to gain employment. The fact that 80% successfully achieve this goal is a fantastic result.

Learn Local

Our pre-accredited programs continue to attract large student numbers. In 2023, 649 people enrolled in variety of classes delivered throughout the year. Our programs have a focus on language, literacy and numeracy, digital literacy and job seeker skills. Each program has a pathway element to it, for which outcomes are either community engagement, volunteering, further education and training or employment.





YCC partners with several other Community Centres and like organisations to deliver our Learn Local programs, including Braybrook Community Centre, Maribyrnong Community Centre, Maidstone Community Centre, McAuley Women's Services, Penrose Promenade Community Centre and the Australian Light Foundation.

We continued to deliver the Volunteer Tutor Scheme in 2023. Volunteer tutors spent one, two or three hours a week, working one-on-one with students who needed support in developing their literacy and numeracy skills. The program provided the opportunity for intense one-to-one work, to develop the students skills and confidence. Thanks to Bridget Horton, Barbara Holland and Paul McSherry for their efforts in continuing with the program and making a difference!




Annual Report _____ Student Stories Natalija Sever

Food Pantry

In addition to the Nourish program YCC has a food pantry at the front of the building in Francis St. The pantry is open 7 days a week and provides our community with an accessible, noquestions-asked access to essential food such as fruit and vegetables, pantry items, bread, etc.

The success of both Nourish and the food pantry is made possible by the generosity of Foodbank Victoria, local supermarkets, and community donors who consistently supply essential meats, vegetables, and fruits to support our operations and replenish our pantry shelves. Family Learning Program at the Western English Language School (WELS).

The YCC Family Learning Program at the Western English Language School (WELS) in Braybrook aims to support parent/carers in improving their English skills, connecting with their child's school, and accessing employment/further training pathways.



In 2023, our Family Learning Facilitator, Lil Fahey, engaged twice weekly with parent/carers. The program covered various topics, including improving English skills, starting life in Australia, connecting with their child's school, and accessing employment/further training pathways.

As a result, we achieved the following outcomes:Parents and Carers established friendships and support systems with each other through information sharing, skill building, and food. The program provided opportunities for parents and carers to share their culture and connect with each other, promoting social inclusion.

This program is funded by ACFE.

Out and About



This project supported community connectedness and wellbeing for adults aged 50+ through participation in a diverse range of indoor and outdoor group activities. YCC worked closely with U3A Maribyrnong to develop activities that were identified by the community as areas of interest. Keeping in mind the focus on building new friendships and promoting health and wellbeing, the project offered activities that included tours to the State Library, Incinerator Gallery, Fitzroy Gardens and a lovely coastal walk. Pickleball sessions were a highlight for many, as was the Watercolour and Mosaic workshop and Forest Therapy Walk. This project was supported through funding from the Maribyrnong Community Grant program.

Community Report Jumpstart Program

YCC provided 20 children and their families experiencing disadvantage an opportunity to participate in sporting activities. Families benefited through building stronger community connections to other families and also to local community recreation and sporting centres. Working with local clubs the children learnt soccer skills, basketball, Australian rules football and first aid. They celebrated their success and friendships at the local bowling club and lunch. This project was supported through funding from VicHealth.



Victoria's Container Deposit Scheme

YCC has been an over-the-counter refund point for the Victoria's Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) since it came into effect. The commitment and contribution from Victorians in participating in this circular economy initiative has been incredible with over 28,000 containers being deposited at YCC from the 1st November to 31st December 2023 alone. All of these containers were hand-counted, checked and sorted by our wonderful staff.



Power Saving Bonus



Launched by the State Government, the \$250 Power Saving Bonus (PSB) is a financial package designed to assist energy consumers in Victoria ease cost-of-living pressures and encourage Victorians to compare their household energy prices and save money. Coordinated by Neighbourhood Houses Victoria, the program aims to raise awareness about the \$250 bonus and encourage community members to compare their household energy prices and, where possible, change to a better energy deal. In 2023, YCC once again supported our community with their online applications ensuring that all community members were able to access this essential service.

Annual Report _____ Childcare Report

The stability of our staff ensured consistent care for the children. Despite starting the year with lower enrolments, we experienced a gradual rise throughout the year, driven by word-of-mouth referrals and social media promotion. Our daily age demographics primarily comprised children under 3 years old, requiring a ratio of 1 educator to 4 children.







The introduction of compost bins allowed us to expand our sustainability efforts for the Centre. Additionally, the children took pride in tending to our vegetable garden, enjoying the harvest of tomatoes and other produce.





Childcare Report

We initiated the process of registering for the Child Care Subsidy (CCS) in 2023, aiming to provide families with the opportunity to claim rebates for childcare fees. Our target is to complete the registration by the second semester of 2024, further easing the financial burden for our families.





Looking ahead to 2024, the YCC Occasional Care team is enthusiastic about reintroducing family activity days, which were paused during the COVID-19 pandemic. Proposed activities include Grandparents Day, Book Club, and Discos, aiming to strengthen the bond between families and the Centre while offering meaningful experiences for children and their loved ones.

My twins are now 4 years old and have been attending YCC occasional care since they were 2 years old. They love the staff and always look forward to attending the Centre. As a first time mum and the first experience of care for my twins, it was such a relief to meet such dedicated, friendly and kind Educators and we are so grateful for all the support from YCC. I highly recommend giving your little ones an opportunity to have some fun, do some crafts and connect with other kids through the caring facilitation of YCC's occasional care program.

Short Course Report

In 2023, following the pandemic, our operations stabilised and we offered 255 classes with a 37% increase in enrolments over the previous year. This growth is attributed to a more diverse range of programs and positive word-of-mouth referrals from our community. Our programs foster a strong sense of community, offering opportunities for socialisation and enhancing YCC's connections within the local community.

From consistently in high-demand health and wellbeing classes, art and style classes, a diverse range of cooking classes and financial literacy to the new offerings for parents with bubs, children and youth, our programs have become more inclusive and appealing to a broader audience.
